3 Policy**P39 3.1 Kaipara District Plan Review Confirmation Of Progress to May 2008**

Policy and Planning Manager 3807.0

A series of workshops have been held with Council over the last six months on reviewing the District Plan. It is now considered an appropriate 'hold point' in the review process to formally confirm that progress. By Council confirming the direction given, staff and consultants can confidently draft chapters of the District Plan.

Attached is a revised workshop schedule for the review of the District Plan. While the dates have not changed, the workshop topics have.

Council confirmation of progress on the District Plan review was last given at their September 2007 meeting.

Recommended

Reason for the recommendation

Certainty of direction is given to staff and consultants so that they can draft the District Plan with confidence.

P40 3.2 Resource Consent Appeal: Tui Family Trust (Applicant)

Development Manager RM050019

A report from the Development Manager is attached relating to resolution of an appeal arising from an application for retrospective consent relating to earthworks on a residentially zoned site at Mangawhai. Palmtree Properties Ltd and another party (since withdrawn) appealed against the decision to grant consent because of concerns about the lack of specificity relating to the terms of conservation covenants and restoration plantings. The proposed Consent Order strengthens the Council's decision.

Recommended

That the appeal by Palmtree Properties Ltd in respect of the resource consent granted to the Tui Family Trust to carry out earthworks on Lot 2 DP 311212 be settled by consent, and the Consent Order be signed on Council's behalf accordingly.

Reason for the recommendation

The Council's interests will not be compromised by allowing the application to proceed in the manner negotiated by mediation; agreeing to settle the appeal by consent saves the expense of a full Court hearing. Council's legal advisors endorse this approach.

3.3 Judicial Committee Membership

Development Manager 1204.0

It is timely to revisit the arrangements for providing resource consent hearings in light of difficulties in achieving a quorum for a hearing recently. As background, the Council considered possible options for delivery of this function at its meeting in February of this year including various combinations of Council members and independent commissioners. In the end Council decided to continue with the previous constitution of the Judicial Committee, resolving as follows:

“That Council appoint a Judicial Committee as per the last term of Council; and

That, nominations for the Judicial Committee be submitted for approval at the next meeting and that those nominated also include those prepared to undertake the Resource Management Act Making Good Decisions Programme.

That, the duly appointed Judicial Committee be asked to develop a “modus operandi” for occasional use of an independent Commissioner.”.

The Council accordingly considered the Judicial Committee membership further at its March meeting and made the following decision:

That the Mayor, Councillors Geange, Guest, Burnett and Sutherland undertake the Resource Management Act “Making Good Decisions” training and become accredited; and

That pending successful completion of the Resource Management Act “Making Good Decisions” training those Councillors who have gained accreditation and are agreeable be appointed to the Judicial Committee.

That the interim arrangement for conducting of resource consent hearings, using Councillors Alspach, Taylor and Smith as Commissioners and Mr David Underwood as an independent Commissioner, continue until the end of June 2008.

At the time this decision was made, the Ministry for the Environment had indicated that the "Making Good Decisions" programme would be completed by the end of June, however this has now been pushed out to September. The consequence of this is that, as the March Council resolution stands, there will be a period of approximately three months from the end of June when both the interim arrangement for conducting hearings will be terminated and the 'new' members will be ineligible to sit on the re-established Judicial Committee. The options which present themselves for addressing this problem are to extend the period of the interim arrangement for several more months, or to re-establish the Judicial Committee and allow the "trainee" members to sit on it.

The latter option is considered preferable for several reasons. Firstly, the Council has indicated a clear preference for having a Judicial Committee above all other options which were presented to it. The first option would delay giving effect to this intention to nearly a year after the term of the new Council had commenced. Secondly, it will provide an opportunity for trainee members to acquire some experience which will give a context for the theoretical training they will be undertaking later in the year. Thirdly, it will make it easier to achieve a quorum for hearings, as this has been experienced as a problem recently (see footnote). In debating these matters previously, Council has indicated a desire for the Judicial Committee to work out some alternative Committee formats to enable more flexibility to apply to dealings with minor applications (these would presumably need to be subsequently ratified by the full Council). The longer the delay in establishing the Judicial Committee, the longer the delay in advancing such proposals.

As already noted, the Mayor and Councillors Geange, Guest, Burnett and Sutherland have agreed to undertake the "Making Good Decisions" training, but only Councillors Geange and Guest have indicated a wish to be members of the Judicial Committee. Once the Judicial Committee is re-established, the Mayor will be ex-officio a member of the Committee regardless of whether or not he has completed the training. The provisions of s39B (see footnote) will still apply. The recommendation is therefore to nominate as new members only those who have indicated a willingness to sit on the Committee.

Recommended

That Councillors Alspach, Smith and Taylor be appointed as members of the Council's Judicial Committee; and

That Councillors Geange and Guest be appointed as members provided they undertake to carry out the necessary training to become accredited; and

That the interim arrangement for conducting of resource consent hearings be terminated, save for any current hearings which stand adjourned.

Reason for the recommendation

To take into account the changed circumstances with the timing of training for accreditation as “Good Decision makers” within the meaning of the Resource Management Act, and to facilitate the hearing of resource consent applications in a timely way.

Note: Section 39B of the Resource Management Act requires that if the resource consent decision making function is to be delegated to a committee, its chairperson must be accredited, and the majority of members must be accredited. This means that as long as two accredited members are available for a hearing, the quorum can be made up with a “trainee” member.

P52 3.4 Mangawhai Surf Club: Proposed Additions and Alterations

Development Manager 2122.11

A report from the Development Manager is attached. The Mangawhai Surf Club is seeking Council approval to making some additions and alterations to the clubhouse to accommodate a food kiosk and provide for additional storage space. This is seen as a way of providing for their future needs financially. Council needs to give its approval as custodian of the land, and as the regulatory body responsible for administering provisions of the Reserves Act, the Resource Management Act and the Building Act. In its custodial role it is concluded that it would be a positive thing for Council to support this initiative. In regulatory terms, as long as the food kiosk operates in a subordinate, ancillary role to the main surf club activity, it is concluded that neither a resource consent nor outline plan are required, and the proposal has no consequences for the operation of the reserve under the Reserves Act. A building consent will however be required.

Recommendation

That Council gives its agreement to the proposed additions and alterations to the Mangawhai Surf Club as indicated on the Mangawhai Draughting and design plans (ref: A3/824 sheets three to six) on the basis that the proposed food kiosk will operate in a subordinate, ancillary role to the operation of the surf club; and

That the Mangawhai Surf Club accordingly be advised that, while no resource consent or Outline Plan are required, a building consent will be required to implement the proposal.

Reason for the recommendation

The proposed additions and alterations will not have any adverse impact on the reserve, and the proposed food kiosk will help the surf club to be financially stronger. All statutory requirements can be met by making application for a building consent.

P61 3.5 RAPID (Rural Address Property Identification) Plate Replacement

Governance Manager 4102.09.01

A report is attached regarding RAPID (Rural Address Property Identification) plate replacement.

The material used for RAPID number plates has faded badly and in many instances the numbers are unreadable. Council has received a number of complaints including one from Kaipara Emergency Services Committee which comprises Police, Fire, Ambulance, Dargaville Medical Centre and Council. The numbering system is frequently used by emergency services and a delay in getting to an emergency could have a serious implications.

A replacement process will involve having a contractor screenprint new white PVC plates with M3 reflective tape digits. The plates will then be mailed out for residents to install.

Pacesetter Print Group Limited has come in at the lowest cost while still providing a quality product. The ability to screen-print plates with Council's corporate logo/colours is an attractive extra that will enable Council to maintain its individuality when compared with the plates used by our neighbours Whangarei and Far North.

Recommended

- 1 **That** Council allocates the sum of \$23,335 (GST exclusive) from its Roading budget to replace all its RAPID (Rural Address Property Identification) number plates with new product supplied by Pacesetter Print Group Limited (Hamilton).
- 2 **That** Council allocates the sum of \$3,510 from its Roading budget to post each plate to its recipient for installation.
- 3 **That** Council charges \$25.00 per new RAPID number plate from 01 June 2008 as being a fair and reasonable cost.

Reason for the recommendation

Council needs to replace the product it uses for its RAPID number plates as the current plates are in many instances, unreadable. Pacesetter Print Group Limited can provide a good product at a reasonable cost.

There is a cost for providing RAPID numbers and plates and this should be passed onto the user as opposed to the general ratepayer.

P65 3.6 Information Centre Relocation

Stakeholder Engagement Manager 2132.03

A report from the Stake Holder Engagement Manager is attached. Council has previously been briefed on a proposal to relocate the Dargaville Information Centre from its current location to the foyer of the Northern Wairoa War Memorial Hall (Town Hall).

There are three main drivers for this proposal:

- To get better value in terms of service from the dollars currently spent.
- A significant reduction in number and type of users of the service.
- Dissatisfaction expressed by members of the tourism industry sector at the service currently provided. Both those who use the service and those who do not.

Other premises have been suggested however this report recommends the relocation of the Information Centre to the Town Hall. The relocation would have positive impacts on both service provision and on cost savings. Further, the relocation would also have positive flow-on effect on staff utilisation across services, i.e. customer service and library.

Recommended

That the Dargaville Information Centre relocate to the foyer of the Northern Wairoa War Memorial Hall prior to the next tourist season.

Reason for the recommendation

The relocation would have positive impacts on both service provision and costs.

P73 3.7 Walker Waiver Development Contribution

Development Manager RM060247

A report from the Development Manager is attached regarding a request that arises from a two lot subdivision of rural land located at Heatley Road, Whakapirau. The application was lodged in October 2006, and consent was granted on 26 July 2007, more than three weeks after the Otamatea Ward Development Contributions Policy for roading came into effect. The applicants seek a waiver of the policy in respect of their application because of delays in the availability of information held by Council which resulted in delays in the decision being issued.

Recommended

That the request by Mr and Mrs JC and ML Walker for waiver of the application of the Council's Development Contributions Policy in respect of the subdivision of Lot 25 DP 202253 (ref: RM060247) be granted.

Reason for the recommendation

The Council acknowledges that the circumstances of this development are sufficiently extraordinary to justify waiving the requirement on grounds of equity, and are not such as to warrant an amendment to the policy.

3.8 Warrants of Appointment: Environmental Northland

Development Manager 3994.0

Council makes every effort to maintain up-to-date warranted personnel. As part of this ongoing process and in-line with warrant expiry dates and changes in legislation Council finds it necessary to update warrants from time to time.

Environmental Northland of Whangarei is the contracted service provider for the Dog, Stock and Noise; and Parking Wardens within the district. We find the various issues relating to dogs such as animal welfare, wandering and aggressive behaviour to very prominent in today's media. Council continues to maintain a high level of enforcement activity especially in larger urban areas. The Dog Control Act 1996 gives Council the power to authorise such people to do this, and for the Council to issue warrants as evidence of the authority from Council in this regard.

Recommended

- 1** **That** Council warrants Stacey Farris, Shane Morris, Harvey Mabbett and Joanne Banks as authorised officers pursuant to s.13; and s.14; and s.17; and s.19; s.19A; and s.59; and s.60; pursuant to Dog Control Act 1996; and s.164; and s.177; and; s.171; and s.172; and s.173; and s.164; and s.245 pursuant to Local Government Act 2002; and; s.38(1)(2)(5)(6); and s.327; and s.328 pursuant to the Resource Management Act 1991;
- 2** **That** Council warrants Stacey Farris, Shane Morris, Harvey Mabbett and Joanne Banks as authorised parking wardens pursuant to s.7 pursuant to Transport Act 1962;
- 3** **That** the Contract held by Environmental Northland Limited for Dog, Stock and Noise Control and Bylaws Response be extended for a period of twelve months from 01 December 2007 to 30 November 2008 on the same terms and conditions as those currently in force as agreed to in their letter of 3 July 2007; or; amendments in legislation; or; pursuant to s.174(4) of the Local Government Act 2002.

Reason for the recommendation

This authorisation is necessary to enable Stacey Farris, Shane Morris, Harvey Mabbett and Joanne Banks to the necessary duties of a Dog, Stock and Noise Control Officer.

This authorisation is necessary to enable Stacey Farris, Shane Morris, Harvey Mabbett and Joanne Banks to undertake the necessary duties of a parking warden in the Kaipara District.

P77 3.9 Halls Update May 2008

Stakeholder Engagement Manager 4603.16

A report is attached outlining the process of implementing Council's Halls Policy, which has taken considerably longer than the anticipated five years.

Despite willingness from both Council and the community the issues and legal constraints associated with transferring ownership of Halls has proven more complex and more difficult than anticipated. The resources required to address the issue are far in excess of those allocated.

The ability to make progress is continually hampered by changes in Committee membership and direction and as the process has gone on so long also by staff and Council changes.

There is a need to reconsider progress and quantify costs, while it may be appropriate to continue the current path, there may be a cheaper, faster or easier method of achieving Council's aims.

Recommended

That Council Staff be requested to provide an Issues and Options paper to Council for discussion during the Kaipara's Future - Working Together (Long Term Council Community Plan) review workshops.

Reason for the recommendation

There is a need to reconsider progress and quantify costs while it may be appropriate to continue the current path, there may be a cheaper, faster or easier method of achieving Council's aims.

P82 5.1 New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement 2008 (Proposed): Kaipara District Council Submission

Policy and Planning Manager 3821.01

The Department of Conservation has released the proposed New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement (NZCPS) for submissions. This is a national policy statement required by the Resource Management Act 1991 (RMA). Its purpose is to state objectives and policies to achieve the purpose of the RMA in relation to the coastal environment. District Plans must give effect to this document, once operative.

The submission period closed on 7 May 2008, with submissions being heard by a Board of Inquiry. The Board will report to the Minister of Conservation any recommendations to change the NZCPS as a result of submissions.

Council submitted on the Issues and Options Paper for this Policy Statement in November 2006. The Policy and Planning Manager drafted a submission to the NZCPS on behalf of Council with input from Councillors Smith and Alspach.

Recommended

That Council receive and endorse the Kaipara District Council submission (dated 7 May 2008) to the proposed New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement.

Reason for the recommendation

The proposed New Zealand Coastal Policy Statement sets guidance for the use of the coastal environment that the Kaipara District Plan must give effect to, therefore it is important for Council to contribute to its formulation.

P90 5.3 Judicial Hearing 29 April 2008: Record of Hearing

Attached is the record of a Hearing which took place on 29 April 2008. Because only two members were present instead of the required three to constitute a quorum, it was not possible to arrive at a formal decision on the matter to be considered for determination. In order to overcome this deficiency with the least inconvenience to all parties concerned, the members proceeded to hear the objection on the basis that any conclusion reached could subsequently be formally ratified by the full Council. Given the nature and scale of the proposed development, the fact that the objector's agent expressed satisfaction with the Council planner's recommendation, and the members indicated agreement with the same recommendation without change, this was considered an appropriate way of dealing with this circumstance.

Recommended

That the record of the Judicial hearing held on 29 April 2008 be received, and the conclusions recorded be endorsed as decisions of Council.

Reason for the recommendation

The conclusions are in accordance with the advice from Council's planners, and have the support of both the objector and the members who were present to consider the matter.

5.5 Contract 559: Moir Street Stormwater and Footpath 2007/08

Community Infrastructural Assets Manager 4104.559

Moir Street Stormwater and Footpath is on the approved programme for 2007/08. Tenders were called in February 2008 and closed in March 2008. Four tenders were received with the tender price ranging from \$622,995.93 to \$855,726.80. The lowest tender is approximately 30% more than the Engineers Estimate. The major items of variance are the swale drain construction, large pipes and manholes. The contract is to be funded within existing LTCCP Project budgets for Mangawhai.

All tenders were assessed against six non-price attributes listed in the Land Transport New Zealand Manual of Competitive Pricing Procedures. The successful tender is United Civil Ltd which is acceptable in terms of non price attributes and is the lowest price conforming tender. Tenders for Contract 559: Moir Street Stormwater and Footpath 2007/08 were assessed using the Lowest Conforming Method of Competitive Pricing Procedures. The contract has been awarded to

United Civil Ltd at a tender price of \$622,995.93.
