Whilst the initial report on all coastal facilities across the District has been completed, unfortunately there is no budget to implement this work. Minor works are required to maintain this seawall. town	investigating whether painting '50' on the road is possible.	An extra 50km sign has been put up at the start of the Pahi township. For Pahi, the Bylaws state a 15km/hr speed restriction shall apply within the Pahi Domain Recreation area, along Fenwicks Point Road cul-de- sac, along Piccadilly Street cul-de- sac and Pahi Road from the wharf to a point along Pahi Road 180 metres to the southwest. These Bylaw signs are in place. Painting speed limits on the road is not a KDC standard as they are too costly to constantly re-mark. They also cause other safety issues, as they are very slippery for other road

		users such as cyclists and pedestrians. The trail of painted speed limits on road at Baylys Beach have been monitored and have shown no difference. Therefore this method has shown ineffective at reducing speeds.

		An Arborist completed this maintenance work in August. There is no maintenance schedule for these trees. Maintenance is undertaken when a need is identified. The community can call Council on 0800 727 059 to request the trees, and any other work that they deem as Council's responsibility, be attended to.

Protect the	Define the area of the camp ground.	Completed
recreation/esplanade reserve for recreational uses		There is a Reserves Management Plan (1996) which contains a map stating that these areas may be used for overflow camping. This whole area is designated as a recreation and camping reserve. There is an Agreement between Council and the Pahi Reserve Society that was done in 2001. There are 18 powered sites for the semi-permanent sites and 25 powered sites for casual camping, making 43 powered sites in all. Before the holidays the Reserve
		Society mows a line ten metres back from the foreshore to leave a public

		access space along the wall where they have some concrete picnic tables. Casual campers are permitted to camp behind the line. They also permit a few people to camp next to Yew Tree Cottage opposite the playground at busy times, notably Regatta weekend, when everybody wants a site. The number permitted to use this area is dependent on the size of the vehicles involved.
Community projects	Give the playground a makeover.	Completed Monthly inspections are undertaken on the Pahi playground. The inspections have been good and the playground has passed as functional. There are no immediate plans nor budget to give the playground a makeover.
	Investigate opportunities for sourcing native seedlings and providing information on species suited to Pahi.	Completed Unfortunately KDC has no source to help. This could be a good community project. However NRC has suggested growing hardy natives such as Kowhai, Kanuka, Totara and Kahikatea to get natural planting started. They should be available from local nurseries and if sourced locally they have a better chance of adapting to the area. Cabbage Trees have been identified by the community as not a desirable option as the leaves are a nuisance when mowing underneath the vicinity of the tree.
