

WHAT WE ARE DOING

- Completing formative consultation with the peoples panel, this information will be used to refine options for consultation.
- Conducting Public Consultation around kerbside general refuse and recycling collection.



WHAT WE ARE DOING

 Complete a Section 17a review of the Solid Waste Activity.

 Reviewing all of the above outcomes prior to going to tender for the kerbside collection of recycling and general refuse plus the management of the Dargaville Transfer Station, potential to include Hakaru Transfer Station.



WHAT WE ARE DOING CONT...

- Extend Contract 706 to align with either 2019/2020 end of financial year or Year 1 of LTP period which commences 2021/2022. This option would also align with the expiry of Contract 484 (Hakaru Transfer Station operation) and would give option of combining both contracts.
- Proposed changes for targeted rates LTP is reviewed and adopted (2021/2022).



WHAT WE ARE DOING CONT ...


 Changes could include introduction of wheelie bins, recycling bins, mixture bag and bin, targeted rates to cover costs with free recycling and general refuse disposal (costs covered in targeted rate).



FUTURE CHANGES — FOOD FOR THOUGHT

- Relocation of Dargaville Transfer Station to Council land down by the Dargaville wastewater treatment plant.
- Purpose built Transfer Station (Resort Centre) that focuses on waste minimisation.
- Investigation and Installation of Waste to Energy and/or incinerator plant at the above location (to be investigated and included as part of LTP review 2021/2022).
- Be a leader in New Zealand in promoting recycling and not using landfilling as option for rubbish disposal.





BACKGROUND

Council requested a policy to include:

- the process for Council appointment to, and removal from the list of Commissioners;
- the standardising of Commissioner remuneration
- the requirement for Council approval of appointments of Commissioners for resource consent hearings
- · a procedure for appointment including:
 - a) an alphabetical acceptance and refusal process to remove bias;
 - a public register recording the process followed in point a)
 - c) a process allowing applicants to refer disputes over appointments decisions to Council for resolution; and
 - mechanisms to allow qualified Elected Members to sit on hearing panels if Council decides to do so.





OTHER ISSUES TO CONSIDER

The ability for Commissioners to hear or be on a panel for bylaw hearings?

Should preference be given to Elected Members?

Should staff have the ability to recommend (& Council the ability to appoint) Commissioners from outside the Independent Hearings Commissioners List?

Should the Mayor/CE be delegated to resolve appointment disputes?

Do Elected Members want exclusion clause to standardised rates to be able pay at higher rates if necessary?















BACKGROUND

- Consent order required risk assessment guide for subdivision consent applications
- KDC agreed at mediation to work collaboratively with FENZ & some of the section 274 parties on this guide
- No local gov precedent to follow for such a guide
- Council Officers can only provide estimate figures for number of consent holders impacted by PC4



ISSUES TO CONSIDER

- Integrity of process and relationships
- Practical application of guide in the field
- Financial and legal ramifications if free consenting process offered
- Ongoing fire risk assessment throughout Kaipara
- Best practice followed to enable collaboration and build KDC reputation not a legal requirement, long term relationship with FENZ required
- Ensure Council
 Officers have a key
 group to help test
 guide
- Legal clarity needed far reaching outcome for other plan changes
- KDC commitment to build KDC fire risk assessment competency




